This year, 29 students from schools including Island School, Harrow and Wah Yan College strutted down the runway wearing brands like KTZ, Zalora and Topshop.

Student Avantika Malhotra gave this project her all, poring over every era and studying each decade's key prints, fabrics, styles and fashion icons.

"If something really stood out to me, I tried to incorporate it," said Avantika, 15. "For example, for the '90s, I saw that women were wearing more

masculine pieces, so I used a shirt pattern in army green and then tailored it. I think that really captured the decade." In comparison, her noughties dress was inspired by Valentino, who placed emphasis on more feminine clothes and prints. Avantika said that she was ecstatic to see her final designs being worn on the runway.

Seven teachers from Island School took an active role in Anaia – something that they had never done in previous shows. Chris Lord, the head of Food Tech, admitted that he had been nervous

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before the show, and that he had been mentally preparing [himself] the night before.

"I'm extremely proud of the entire team for their dedication to the cause, and the event was spectacular," said Alsha, 16, before adding that it had not been without challenges.


"We had some stressful moments trying to reach deadlines, but we couldn't be happier with the outcome."
