Applied Learning Pathway Results (BTEC) 2020










School Response to Current Situation

- 4. The DLA is underpinned by a comprehensive monitoring, student support and communication processes that ensure the well being and academic progress of every student.



IB Updates


- Exams scheduled for May 2021 as normal

- Priority sessions for coursework and practicals












Exam & Assessment Preparation

Academic Honesty

Island School: Academic Honesty in the IB Diploma and Applied Learning Pathway

Academic Honesty Expectations

Taking the School Code and the IB Learner Profile as their inspiration, Island School students inquire and then communicate their knowledge in a principide way. Island School students strive for excellence within a community founded on integrity and respect in which there is a strong emphasis on taking responsibility. As students move through the MVP. Futures and DPI/ALP pathways they acquire and develop research skills, and build the integrity of their work, that they will need both in school and beyond as lifetion learners.

With these aims in mind, this document presents the school's expectations for DP and ALP students concerning academic honesty. Academic honesty must be seen as a set of values and skills that promote personal integrity and good practice in teaching, learning and assessment.¹ Failure to comply with the IBO's and the BTEC regulations may have serious consequences, not least the possible failure of the entire course.

Academic Honesty

Students must behave ethically in tests and comply with exam regulations.

All students are expected to demonstrate academic honesty in the completion and submission of all work. To achieve this, students need to know what is acceptable practice and they are educated on this by their House Team, Subject Teachers and the Library Team. This should enable them to learn to avoid collusion and plagnism when using another person's work.

Collusion is the supply of work from one person to another, knowing that it will be submitted (in whole or in part) by that person as his / her own.

Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's work as one's own, in whole or in part, without acknowledgement.

Paraphrasing It is perfectly acceptable to use someone else's words or ideas, providing the source of the information is acknowledged. Changing the order of words or phrases, or the order of the original sentence and failing to cite the source, is unacceptable and regarded as plagiarism. Students must attibute ideas, information or quotations derived from a known source. Information that is common knowledge does not require an attributed.

If a student has any questions about academic honesty they are encouraged to seek advice from their House Team, Subject Teachers or the Library Team. Any work submitted for assessment must be properly referenced in accordance with exam board and/or school guidance.

Written work will often be put through 'turnitin' or similar checking tool to establish authenticity. All work which is to be submitted for external assessment will be authenticated by the school. The school will not submit work that cannot be authenticated as the student's own. Any questions over the authenticity of a piece of work will be resolved by interviewing the student to establish the work is their own.

Whilst it is acceptable to use templates and writing frames in preparatory work they are not permitted when submitting externally assessed course work. Whils students are encouraged to seek feedback on their work it is not allowable to have a piece of work edited by another.

The consequences of general malpractice and plagiarism, intentional or not, in an exam or on piece of coursework are at the exam board's discretion. This can have severe consequences, one of which is disqualification from the IB Diploma or BTEC.

It is the responsibility of parents to ensure that any tutors employed are aware of the school's expectations with regard to academic honesty.

Island School: Academic Honesty in the IB Diploma and Applied Learning Pathway

Academic Honesty Contract

As an Island School student I recognise that:

- I must behave in a honest and principled way when taking tests
- Any work I submit will be my own
- The text or ideas of another person, if incorporated in my work, must be acknowledged using a recognised convention of citation.
- The acknowledgement of sources is a standard academic practice that must be observed.
- The same piece of work cannot be submitted for different aspects of assessment.
- I must not give my own work to another student knowing that it will be submitted for assessment as the work of that student
- It is a breach of regulations to give or receive confidential information about exams, or bring unauthorised material into an exam.
- That apart from collaborative work specified by the exam board or a teacher, producing an assignment with another person is collusion and therefore a form of malpractice.
- I must not attempt to gain, or offer to another candidate, an unfair advantage in any aspect of assessment.
- All work that I submit for assessment must be authentic, and failing to sign a declaration to this
 effect may result in my work not being assessed.

If work submitted fails short of these expectations, in the first instance, the teacher will discuss it with the student and advise them further on our expectations and how to meet them. The teacher may ask for the work to be done again and they will notify the student's Tutor.

If it happens again, or there is malpractice on a test, the Head of House or Vice Principal will invite parents into discuss an appropriate response.

Repeated academic malpractice is a serious matter. The school is required to notify the exam board and it may result in exclusion.




Academic Honesty

Collusion is the supply of work from one person to another, knowing that it will be submitted (in whole or in part) by that person as his / her own.

Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's work as one's own, in whole or in part, without acknowledgement.

Paraphrasing - Using other people's ideas is ok but it must be cited and referenced. Re-wording ideas is still someone else's idea so still needs to be cited.









Private Tutors (or parents) should not be involved in any coursework










The RSE is a new ESF-wide curriculum based on the UNESCO's Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE). It covers 6 concepts with topics such as:







Form #

- 1. The application limit is 11 universities, which is in accordance with the Island School Higher Education policy.
- You must complete the HEAS Form properly and get it signed by your parent/guardian and reference writer. You must submit it IN PERSON to your HE Counsellor by or before 12 October 2020.
- Your must complete the Gateway KE: module indicating your intert to apply to the specified universities.
 If the HC Office is required to send any documents by postermal to the universities, your must supply the full addresses itemail addresses with Cear indication of what needs to be sent included and pays for the postage or counter (as applicable) in advance. Capies of certificate/zaam results must be certified a true capies by the Schod's Exam Office and must be supplied to the HE/Office as certified documents.

The School cannot guarantee that your requests will be processed on time if you fail to meet any of the above requirements. The School reserves the right to refuse requests it deems make unreasonable demands on members of the staff.
